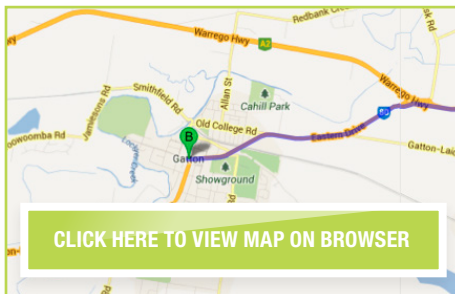

The PICU is known nationally as one of the most well run and busiest critical care centers in the country. It manages very complex cardiology, oncology, medical and surgical cases as well as every day emergencies. Ellie shares her home with 4 cats, her dog and the Englishman she came back with. On days off she revels in domesticated bliss, studying or hiking.
